Chairman's Opening Address

The Chairman (Ruth Gouldbourne) opened the meeting at 7pm, and followed with her report of the past year's activities, which included our three areas of activity (education and getting to know one another, worship, and social action) and changes to the Executive and the Constitution, namely:

- "Meet the Neighbours" and "Join the Neighbours"
- Worship together at Pentecost (at St James' Piccadilly) and Advent (at Hinde St Methodist Church) and The Cross on Victoria Street on Good Friday.
- Prisons Mission and praying together in Prisons Week, plus a new Resource Booklet.
- Executive changes with "goodbyes" and grateful thanks to David Mannarino, Ray Crocker, Deborah Colvin, Graham Mizon, and Philip Majcher, and "welcome" to Andreea Gherman as Treasurer, and Richard & Caroline Mingay from Salvation Army.
- Constitution the previous Constitution is lost, so a new one has been written. The opportunity was taken to bring it up to date in line with Churches Together in England models. Our thanks to John Plummer and Philip Cotterell (who acted as consultant).

CTiW Constitution: Presented by John Plummer

This document describes the function & governance of CTiW. January 2019 will be the first AGM under this new constitution which has been adopted by the Executive.

1st Presentation: Ealing Animal Charities 40th Anniversary Fair: Speaker, Dr Marion Garnett

2nd Presentation: Shrinking the Footprint. Church of England's national environment programme:

Speaker, Brian Cuthbertson, Head of Environment and Sustainability

Unfortunately this speaker could not attend but sent apologies and the following notes :

"Shrinking the Footprint has been running for more than decade now, encompassing a growing range of environmental activity, from practical action on the ground to public awareness raising and political campaigning. A flavour can be had from the campaign's latest bulletin http://www.churchcare.co.uk/images/Enews winter 2017.pdf Initiatives highlighted include the Church Times Green Awards for churches, engagement with investors and companies to bring their business plans in line with international climate targets, and working with schools, young people and communities. Many of these involve partnering with others – a sure way to gain more traction. That includes partnering between departments in the Church of England – a fact which will soon be recognised by re-branding Shrinking the Footprint as simply 'The Church of England Environment Programme'.

Much of the programme's work takes place at the level of the 42 dioceses of the Church of England, of which the Diocese of London is one. A bewildering variety of projects is shared between Diocesan Environmental Officers at their annual conference. London Diocese is strongly committed to Shrinking the Footprint. While we have our own projects and programmes, these are firmly plugged into the national campaign. As with Shrinking the Footprint, our primary focus is reducing the carbon footprint of churches in order to contribute to the worldwide effort against climate change. First and foremost this involves measuring and cutting energy use in churches. A landmark programme of audits to help churches in Islington do that is currently being sponsored by the 500 year old charity Cloudesley. Use of water and handling of waste and recycling are also vital strands in our work, as is the appreciation and safeguarding of wildlife in our churchyards. CTiW Finance & Treasurer's Report: Presented by CTiW Treasurer, Andreea Gherman.

It was reported that the current balance is £990.89. Suggested Membership donation remains unchanged at £30 for 2018/19 and letters will be sent out to everyone in early February 2018. At the beginning of 2017, there were 25 active paid up memberships.

CTiW Prisons Mission Report: Presented by John Plummer, Co-ordinator.

A written report was also circulated. John said the latest Prisons Week Resources Booklet had been widely distributed and well received. The Mission is working with three prisons at the moment, and although their contribution is small, it is definitely worthwhile and welcomed by both chaplains and prisoners.

3rd Presentation: Christian Aid Climate Justice "The Big Shift": Speaker Kathy Childress

Kathy spoke of the need to shift from fossil fuel to green clean energy. They are challenging the high street banks. How we invest affects poor communities. Churches need to be involved. The climate is in trouble, and we should think how we can make a difference by life style changes. There is a role for Christians - need for churches a well as governments to raise voice. 2nd Keynote speaker: **Anglican Society for the** Welfare of Animals (ASWA): Speaker Rev'd Jenni Brown

What has Christianity to do with animals? God gave us responsibility to care for both the environment & non -human species, and calls for us to reconcile our broken relationship by showing kindness to animals and defending their rights and habitats, choosing animal-friendly foods and cruelty-free products. ASWA welcomes all Christians.

Q: Surely Christians not supposed to judge others? A: Actions are often due to ignorance, so we should seek to educate, not scold. Remember wars started by human action animals have no choice.
